INTRODUCTION:

Chair of APCC: Marc Jones

This month we are marking 10 years since Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) were first democratically elected and started making a real difference by giving the public a stronger voice in policing and criminal justice than ever before.

Throughout the year we have been highlighting some of the key areas in which PCCs have brought positive change to the landscape.

As PCCs, our fundamental role is to ensure the effectiveness and efficiency of policing in our areas. We do this through holding the budget for our forces, setting priorities tailored to the needs of our communities through our police and crime plans and through holding Chief Constables to account for their delivery against our plans.

We are the voice of the public in policing, democratically elected to meet the needs of the communities in which we serve. With this, we commission vital support services for victims and ensure the voice of the victim is heard in the criminal justice system. We do this in our wider role as chairs for our local criminal justice boards, which bring criminal justice partners together to deliver improvements on the ground.

The APCC's 'Victims In Focus' report highlights the innovative work that Police and Crime Commissioners have implemented to develop practices which support victims, demonstrating their commitment and collaborative approach to tackling some of the most harmful and traumatic crimes.

APCC Victims Leads, Donna Jones and Sophie Linden:

"Victims' advocacy is at the heart of everything Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) do. By commissioning essential services, they are supporting victims in their journey to recovery. PCCs work hand in hand with partner organisations and stakeholders to deliver these services and understand how to put victims needs at the centre of the criminal justice system. They also have an integral role in listening to victims' voices and advocating for them both locally and nationally, including through the delivery of local Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) action plans."

The work of PCCs were highlighted in the APCC's 'Victims In Focus' report, which focused on:

Advocating for victims:

Ensuring victims are placed at the heart of decision-making through ensuring their voices are heard and advocating for their rights.

Developing innovative services for victims:

PCCs are at the forefront of developing unique and innovative approaches to victims' support services and making positive impacts in their communities.

Using multi-year funding to fund quality services for victims:

PCCs commission quality victim-support services across England and Wales. Securing multi-year funding means PCCs can develop longer-term, sustainable approaches to support services, including new innovations.

THE THEME FOR THIS YEAR'S TWO-DAY PARTNERSHIP SUMMIT WAS 'CUTTING CRIME, BUILDING CONFIDENCE'

Over 500 delegates attended the Summit, which brought together senior police officers, Police and Crime Commissioners, decision makers from national organisations and included key-note speeches from the Home Secretary, Shadow Home Secretary and Policing Minister.

For the second time the Summit was opened by Marc Jones, APCC Chair and Martin Hewitt, NPCC Chair and hosted by Journalist and presenter, Clive Myrie.

APCC Chair, Marc Jones: "This event has never been so timely or important. Not just for policing, but for community safety, for criminal justice and, of course for victims and the public we all serve."
